
















Inspired Giving








North County Senior Connections

The NCSC program, launched in November 2014, addresses food security and healthy aging for vulnerable seniors in North County San Diego. The program focuses on nutritious meals provided by a foodtruck, along with activities aimed at reducing senior isolation. NCSC is a collaboration of the Rancho Santa Fe Foundation, Dreams for Change, Interfaith Community Services, the San Diego Foodbank and Dickinson Farms.




